Welcome to Reading Rocks Reviews, a 5 lesson week English project in which children write, video and share their own book reviews with the help of some well known authors including Michael Rosen.

You'll not only be engaging your pupils with digital literacy but also immersing them in the text of your chosen book, exploring storylines, authorial intent and comprehension. The project covers curriculum objectives from ICT and literacy, to not only engage your children but make excellent progress in the process.

The final output is a recorded book review video which will be shared with the school in [assembly](#). To see what your final video might look like, watch [these example videos](#).
