

This Is Us! Poetry Project

This is Us! is the perfect start of year literacy project. Get to know your class and their background whilst, absorbing them with writing poetry for a purpose, with support from accredited poet, Joseph Coelho. The mix of backgrounds, cultures and memories that go into making your class is something to be reflected on and celebrated in this project. This can help encourage an accepting and global mindset in your class whilst celebrating the individuals that come together to make community.

The project covers curriculum objectives from PSHE, British Values, Geography as well as ICT and literacy.

The final recorded poem will be a culmination of all of the children's stories, a real celebration of diversity and what makes your class unique. This can be easily celebrated in assembly, at your own Poetry Slam (see lesson 10) and online, just tag @LitFilmFest and we'll send your class a 'well done'!
